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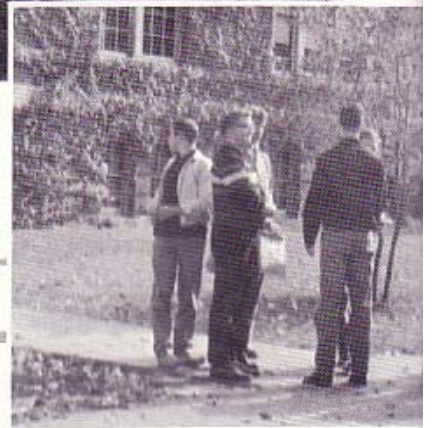
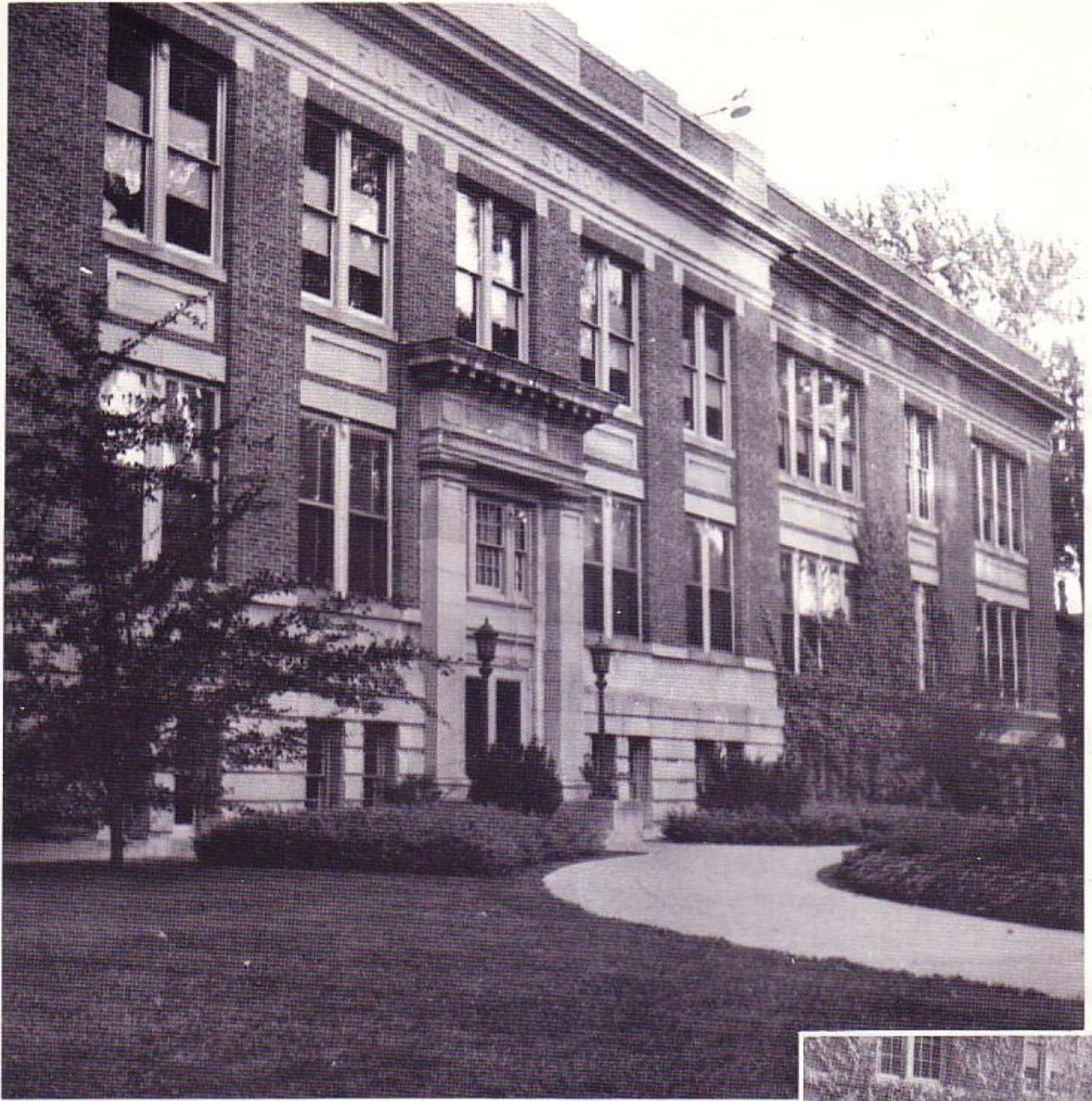
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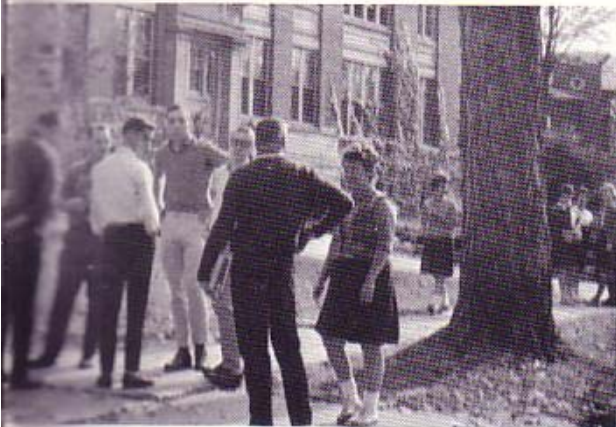
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Learning, Experiencing, Advancing

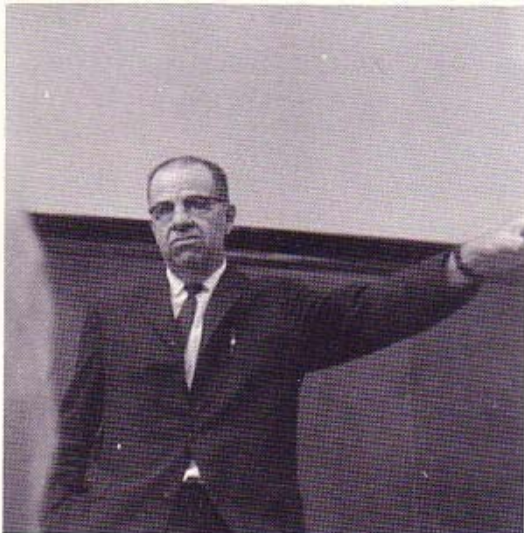
After attending the Oswego Normal School, Mr. Tyler received his B.S. and M.S. in Social Science from Syracuse University.

Mr. Tyler was freshman baseball coach for three years, track coach for nine years, and adviser to the delegates who attended the Citizenship Education Conference at Syracuse University.

During his forty-four year residency at Hannibal, he has been very active in civic affairs. His services as mayor of Hannibal for four years and his membership on the village board for six years, have been two of his contributions to Hannibal's citizenry. Thirty years' experience as chief of the Volunteer Fire Department, has qualified him for the jobs of Deputy Fire Co-ordinator for Oswego County, and state appointed County Fire Instructor. His family, two boys and a girl, are well on their ways to careers of their own.

Mr. Tyler's classes are freely enough organized that his students have the opportunity to discuss current events and the subject which headlines today's news. 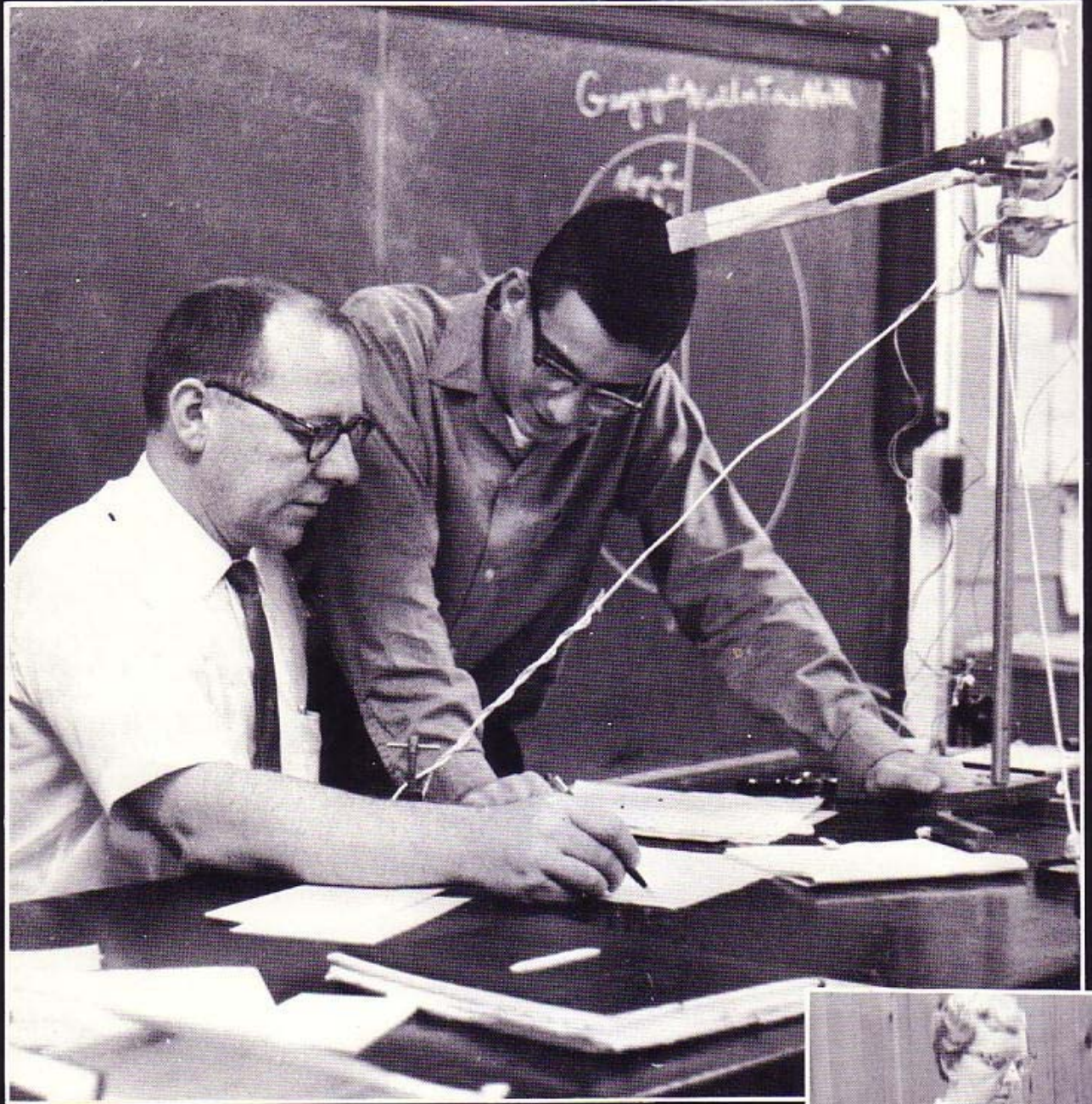
Students are kept aware of the actions of local representatives, both in Albany and Washington.

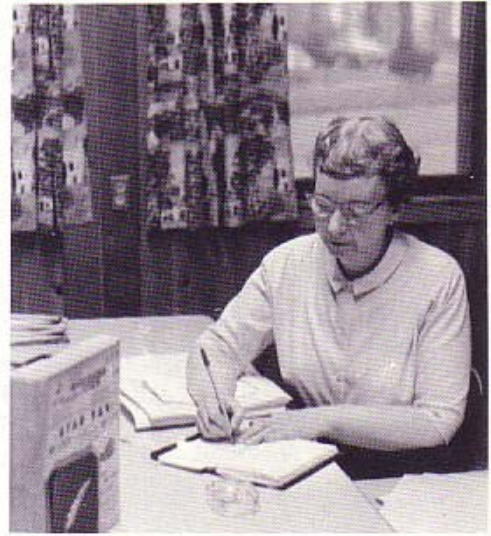
Mrs. Ducret is secretary to Mr. Frawley and performs clerical duties in connection with the business office and adult education program.

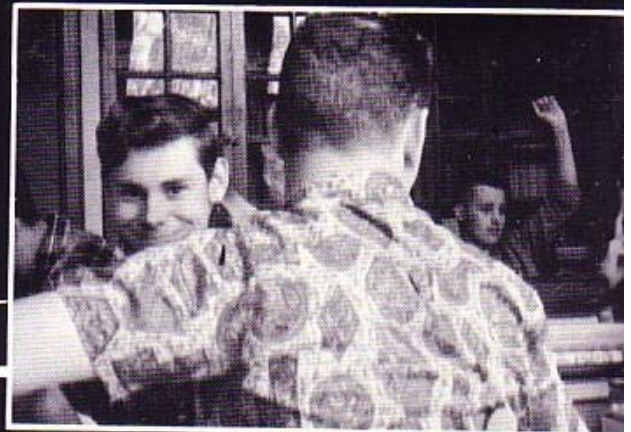
Seniors

Therefore we bid farewell to this school and hope that others who follow may benefit as well from their experiences here.



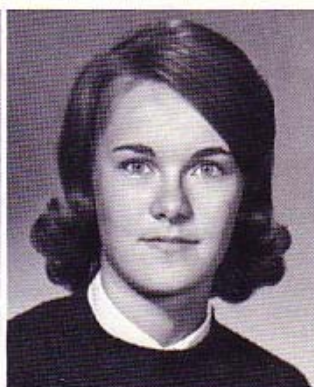

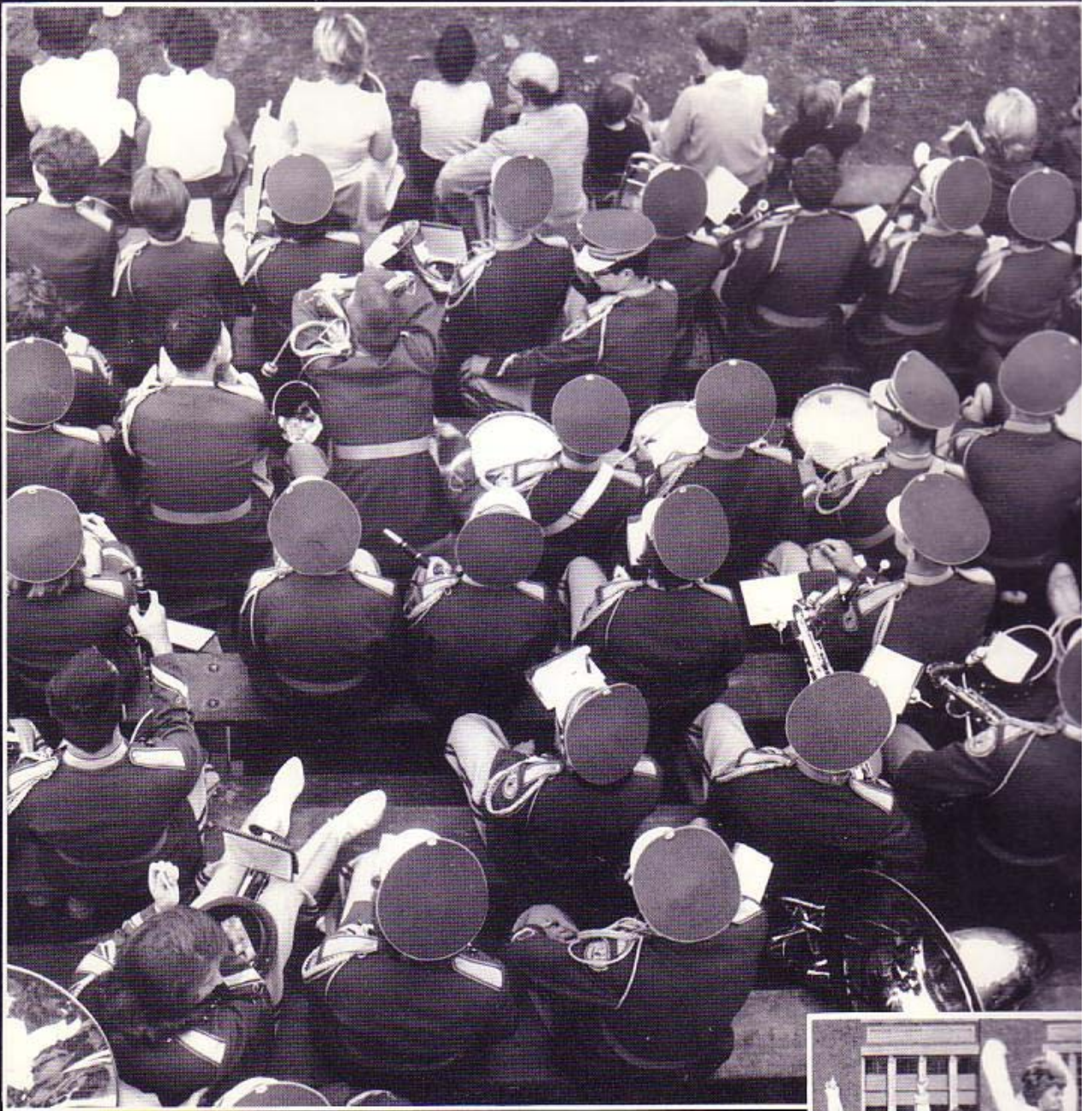


Gene MacDaniel

Striving and Socializing

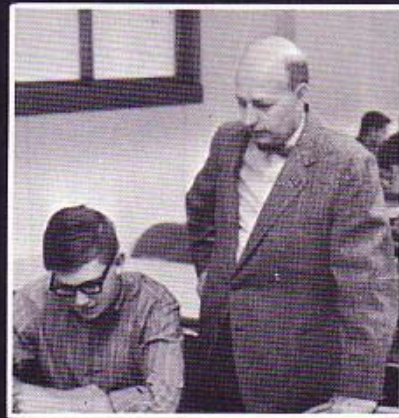
All through the year at Fulton High, students throng to its many activities. Every club in the school has at least one special annual event: there are dances, bake sales, assemblies and guest speakers. During May and June many picnics and parties are scheduled. These activities are educational as well as social. There are language clubs which allow only the foreign language to be spoken at meetings. Some of the language clubs emphasize the appreciation of the culture of their countries.

National Thespian Society, National Honor Society and Varsity Club are honorary; memberships in these are rewards for special achievement. Some organizations such as Girls' Athletic Association, Ski Club, and Library Club recognize and encourage special proficiencies and skills. With over thirty organizations in the school, each student can find one to fit his special hobbies and abilities.

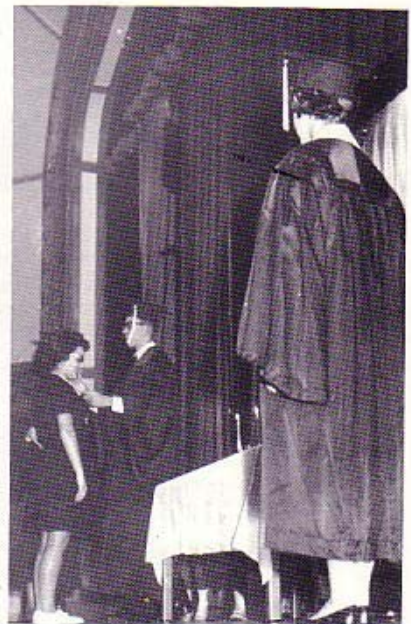


Society

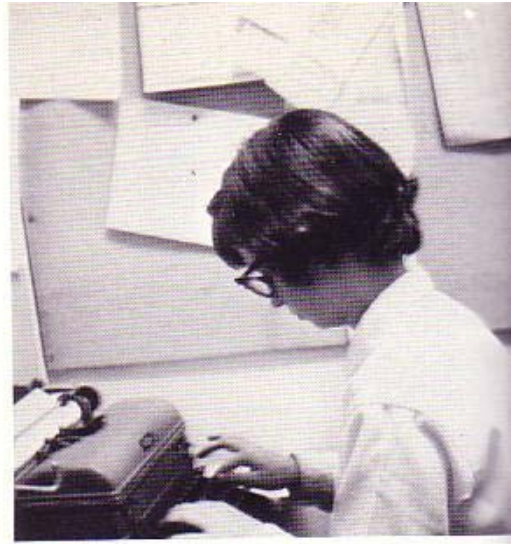

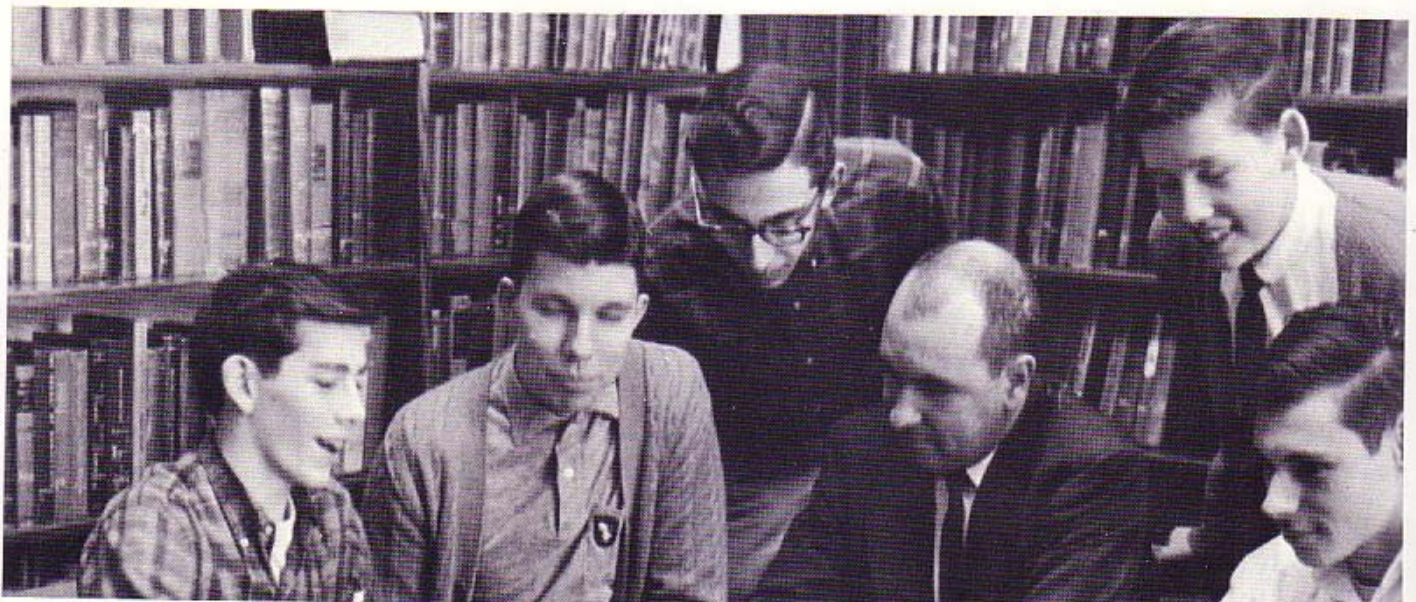
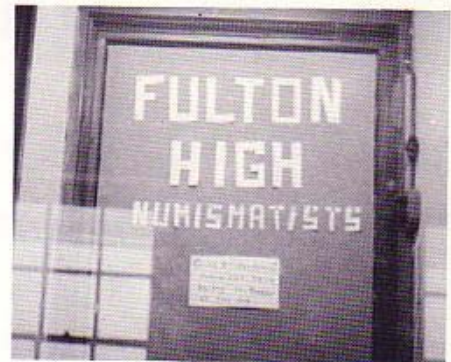
Numismatists

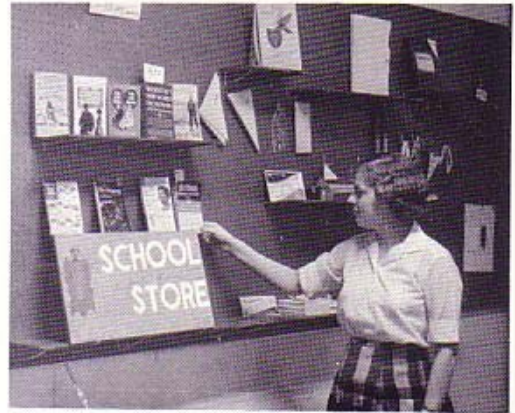
Business Club

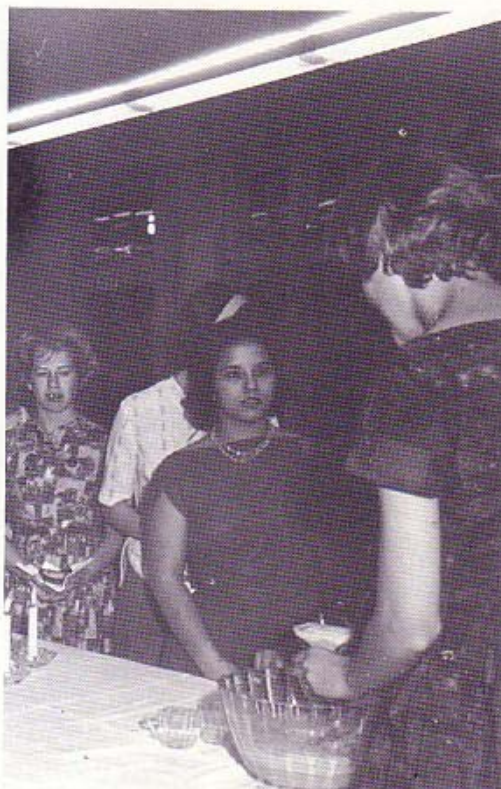

Varsity Club provides funds for many extras for the athletic teams, by sponsoring and operating a stand at football games.

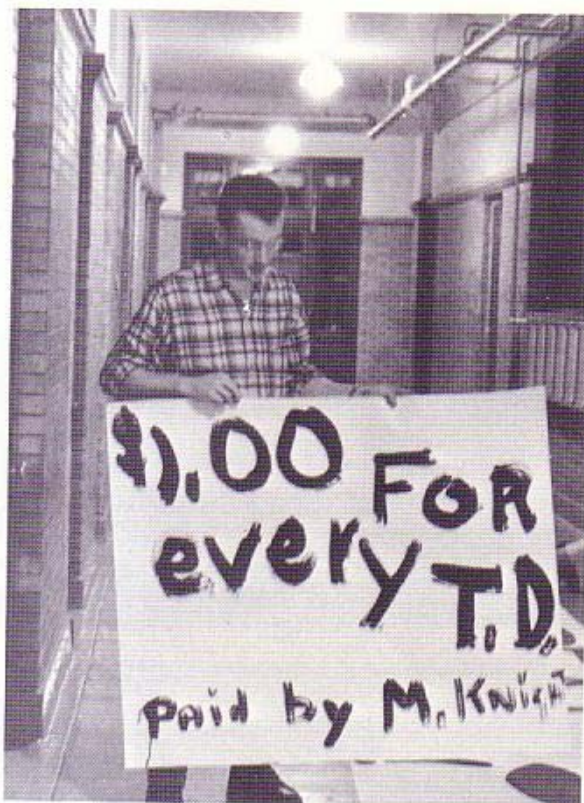

These jumping, yelling bundles of energy that you see at all our games are the cheerleaders. Their enthusiasm is contagious; you gain confidence in your team because they have confidence.

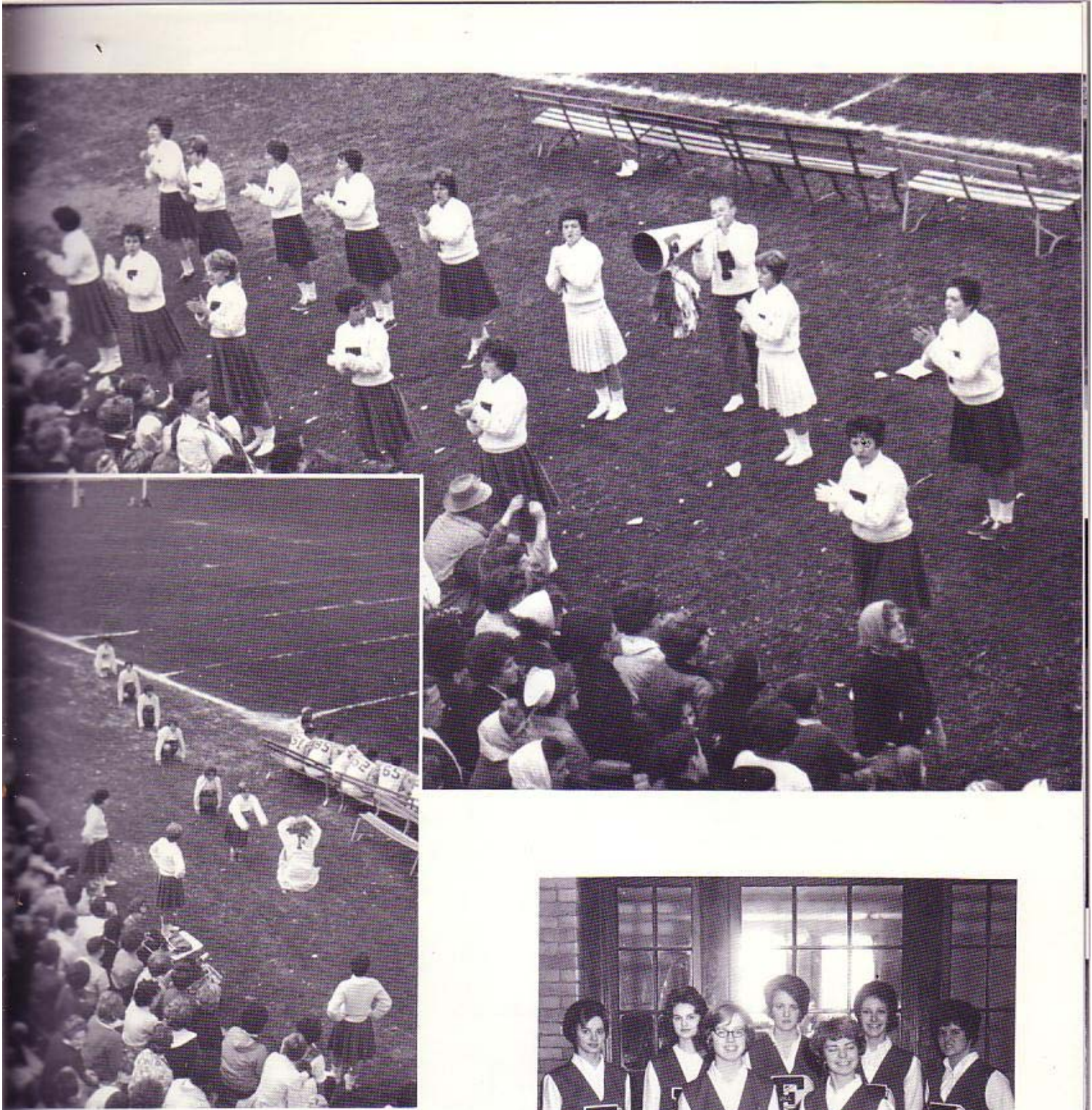

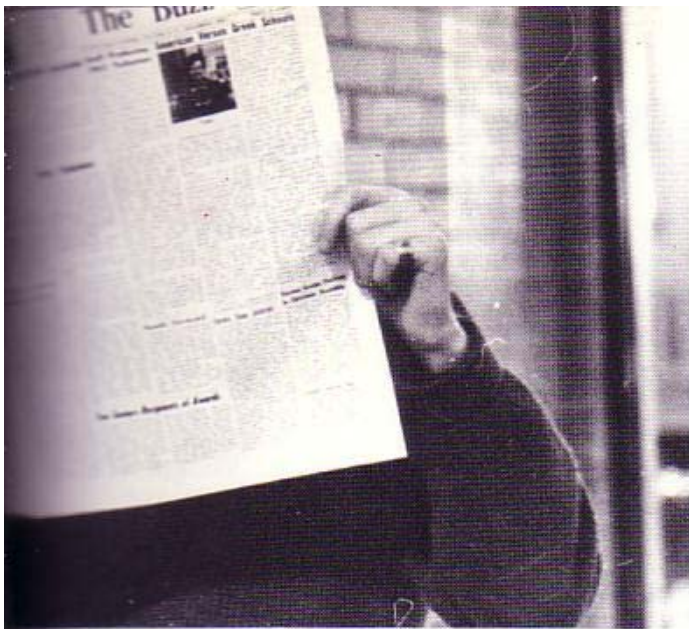
Jill Pratt and Ronnie Haskins headed the circulation and business staffs respectively.

Sportsmanship and Skills

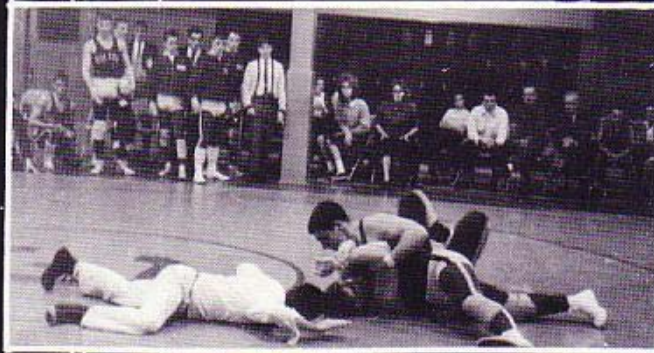
